Police Training

The Fox Chapel Police do not employ any use of neck or head restraints during any use of force events. They do not train, condone, permit, or allow any restraint that reduces the subject's ability to breathe. To that end, the Fox Chapel Police have received training on "Positional Asphyxiation." This training mandates that all arrested suspects are monitored every 30 seconds by a "cover" officer to verify that the suspect is not suffering from any unforeseen medical condition that would endanger their lives.

All Fox Chapel officers receive refresher training on all policies and procedures regularly. The Police Department's policies are drafted with the guidance of the Allegheny County District Attorney, and the Allegheny County Chiefs of Police Association. Guidance is also obtained from the International Chiefs of Police Association. The Fox Chapel Police Department also stands committed to providing professional, non-biased, law enforcement services to their community. They strive to provide the highest level of professional law enforcement to their valued stakeholders, the residents of Fox Chapel Borough.

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We All Live Downstream

In natural areas, stormwater is not a problem. Nature has managed stormwater through the Hydrologic Cycle. Stormwater has been recycled since the dawn of time.

In developed areas, both urbanization and agriculture have altered the Hydrologic Cycle and the natural management of stormwater. People have tried to control stormwater runoff, but in many cases have created more significant problems, increasing flooding, erosion, and pollution.

Legislation was passed that requires municipalities and developers to install best management practices that will help manage stormwater following the principles of the Hydrologic Cycle. Practices have also been implemented that decrease non-point source pollution.

Non-point source pollution is all the stuff stormwater picks up as it runs over land to the sewer and eventually the stream. Non-point source pollution includes oil, sediment, nutrients, and bacteria from pet waste, chemicals, and nutrients from garden and lawn chemicals, litter, etc. You can help decrease stormwater runoff and prevent non-point source pollution by following these tips:

- Use Rain Barrels- Rain Barrels capture and store rain, making it available for watering gardens, washing cars, and for other activities that you would use your hose for. The collected rainwater is used in place of your utility or well water, therefore reducing costs. The stored rainwater will not contribute to stormwater runoff, which causes flooding and carries pollution to our streams.
- Minimize Lawn Chemicals- Stormwater can carry pesticides and herbicides into the stream. Try natural lawn care methods instead of chemicals. If using chemicals, make sure to follow directions, and do not apply when the forecast is calling for rain.
- Properly Dispose of Hazardous Waste: Do not dump anything down storm drainsthey drain directly to the creek. Check with your Borough for the location of a hazardous waste pickup site or visit the Borough website for details.
- Pick Up After Your Dog: Pet waste can contribute nutrients and bacteria to our stream. In drinking water areas, bacteria can form algae, which can be costly to treat. These costs can be passed on to you.
- Only Rain in the Drain: Never put anything into storm sewers, including oil, paint, soap, debris, leaves, etc. Storm sewers do not go to the sewer plant but discharge directly into our streams. You might be pouring oil into your drinking water!
- Plant Native Trees and Shrubs: Riparian buffers are the vegetated areas alongside streams. They are an essential part of the natural ecosystem and vital to the health of streams and their organisms, including plants, fish, and other aquatic organisms.

Do your part for your neighborhood. Help prevent stormwater pollution and Keep Our Streams Clean!



Paving Underway

Due to COVID-19, the 2020 Paving Project had to be modified. The Borough's primary sources of revenue, such as earned income tax and real estate transfer tax, have been impacted a great deal. This has caused some roads on the paving schedule to be postponed. The Public Works Department has been busy this Spring preparing the roads for paving.



Spotted Lanternfly Quarantine

Department of Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding announced that Allegheny County is one of twelve counties that has been added to the spotted lanternfly quarantine zone. Allegheny County is not completely infested, but rather has one to three municipalities with a known infestation, which led to a quarantine being placed on the entire county out of an abundance of caution.

Fox Chapel Borough bans Coal-Tar Sealcoat


Coal-Tar based seal coat is the black, viscous liquid sprayed or painted on many asphalt parking lots, driveways, and playgrounds to protect and enhance the appearance of the underlying asphalt. It is a toxic byproduct of coking coal. Studies by the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS), academic institutions, and State and local agencies have identified coal-tar-based pavement seal coat as a major source of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon (PAH) contamination in urban and suburban areas and a potential concern for human health and aquatic life. Fox Chapel has taken action to ban the dangerous chemical from our community, citing concerns for the health of residents and abundant aquatic life in our streams. Asphalt based sealers are a much safer alternative, comparably priced, and sold widely in home improvement stores.

Residents may contact the Borough office if they have concerns related to the use of coal tar-based sealants.

Fox Chapel Water Authority

Fox Chapel Water Authority (FCWA) is a separate entity located at 255 Alpha Drive in RIDC Park that provides public water service to residents. The Borough contracts with FCWA to bill sewage for the Borough and ALCOSAN. Please call FCWA for all water issues and water or sewer billing questions at 412/963-0212. FCWA use white trucks, and Borough personnel use green vehicles.



NIXLE

Nixle has made some changes to the way messages are delivered. Informational messages such as Advisory and Community messages will only be delivered to the email address on file (if any) and the Everbridge Mobile App. This effectively reserves the SMS channel (text message) for Emergency Alerts, while still getting the informational messages out via email and Mobile App. Residents with an email on file will only receive an email, not SMS. Residents with only an SMS number on file will receive an SMS. Emergency alerts will always go out via SMS, email, web, and Mobile Push channels. Borough Right-of-Way

A reminder to Borough residents to refrain from placing permanent structures in the Borough right-of-way adjacent to the pavement such as pillars, mailboxes and other items that include sprinkler heads and invisible dog fences. Should the Borough need to work along the right-of-way of your property, all items will need to be removed, and the Borough is not responsible for replacing. This also includes landscaping. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Soliciting

In order for a property owner to keep all solicitors away, the property must be posted "No Trespassing" or "No Soliciting." The Borough does have an ordinance to keep commercial solicitors and peddlers away from homes; however, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that non-commercial solicitations cannot be regulated. The Borough maintains a list of homeowners not wanting commercial solicitors. We strongly recommend posting your property to eliminate unwanted soliciting.



Attention homeowners with fire and security systems

If you have an alarm system in your home, please make sure to inform your security company of alternate phone numbers where you can be reached as well as a secondary contact and phone number. In the event the police and/or fire department are called to your home, a secondary contact is beneficial should you be unavailable, and entrance into your home is needed. Systems need to be checked yearly to guarantee your safety.



Be Thankful For Our Volunteer Firefighters

Thank you for your generous donations to the Fox Chapel Volunteer Fire Department over the last four years. With your support, we were able to purchase a new Seagrave Pumper truck in 2019. Our volunteers invest a significant amount of time serving this community. These time commitments include operational responses (often at a moment's notice), hours of training every year to ensure our readiness to respond when needed most, vehicle and station maintenance, and various administrative duties. Many residents have given generously in the past, and we thank you. If you have not yet contributed, we ask that you consider donating this year.

We are your neighbors, your co-workers, and your friends. Twenty-four hours a day, three hundred sixty-five days a year, we volunteer our time to protect your lives and property. Please consider the value of their service to the Borough when you are asked to support a fund drive for the new rescue truck in the coming months.

The Borough is seeking residents to serve with the Planning Commission by becoming a member of the Joint Comprehensive Plan Committee with O'Hara Township.


Duties to oversee:

Foxwall delivers advanced emergency medical care to the residents of Fox Chapel and Aspinwall Boroughs, as well as neighboring communities whenever needed. Foxwall relies on your continued participation in our annual subscription drive, happening right now! In addition, we depend heavily on donations and other support from the members of the Fox Chapel and Aspinwall community to sustain our operations. We are most fortunate to have the support from our dedicated EMS personnel. Our staff of 35 providers contributes their time and talent to caring for the sick and injured of the community whenever the need arises. All are educated as Emergency Medical Technicians or Paramedics with expertise in prehospital care. Many of our staff have additional advanced training in the treatment of stroke, heart attack, traumatic injuries, and technical rescue. Our team collaborates closely with the local police and fire departments to provide a coordinated response to any emergency residents and visitors may experience.

Foxwall's current roster includes many EMS trained college students from local universities, career EMS professionals and, volunteers who live in the community. Foxwall's roster also includes volunteers and career personnel who do not live nearby but are willing to contribute many long hours, assuring we provide the best quality EMS.

Dog Park Rules

These Rules are intended to protect the use and enjoyment of the park. Violation of the Rules may result in a citation and/or loss of park privileges.

- 1. Use at own risk. Dogs are off-leash!
- 2. Open dawn to dusk.
- 3. Owners must control and be in view of their dog(s) at all times: prevent aggressive behavior, biting, fighting, or excessive barking.
- 4. Handlers must have leashes accessible when dogs are off-leash.
- Handlers must pick up after dogs and dispose of in approved containers no littering!
- 6. Professional/Commercial dog walkers prohibited.
- 7. Max of 2 dogs per handler permitted.
- 8. Owner is responsible for injury/damage caused by dog(s).
- 9. Dogs must be appropriately licensed/vaccinated with tags on collar.
- 10. Dogs and horses only no other animals permitted.
- 11. Dogs not permitted include less than four mos. old, in heat, sick, designated dangerous by the Courts or history of aggressive behavior.
- 12. Rules enforced by State Dog Warden and Police.

Dog Walkers

Residents are asked to please be respectful and responsible when walking their dogs by cleaning up, disposing of waste properly and policing others to do the same. The Borough receives many complaints about waste left along roads and trails or bags of waste thrown in trees along the trails. Please do the right thing when walking your dog. The Borough and fellow residents, thank you!



What To Do When You Spot A Coyote

Residents have spotted coyote for years around the Borough of Fox Chapel. While coyote are generally fearful of people, they can sometimes be spotted crossing yards or streets. This behavior is not unusual, especially in residential areas bordering on open space where they find their natural prey. They may also be taking a shortcut to their favorite hunting ground. This type of sighting generally requires no response-other than making sure that pets and children are secure and there are no likely food attractants present in the area.

Eastern coyotes are naturally timid animals and will typically flee at the sight of a human. If they linger or approach, it's time to begin "hazing." This is a term applied to the following actions that can be taken to scare coyotes and chase them away:

- Be as big and loud as possible. Do not run or turn your back.
- Wave your arms, clap your hands, and shout in an authoritative voice.
- Make noise by banging pots and pans or using an air horn or whistle. These sounds can also alert the neighbors.
- Throw small stones, sticks, tennis balls, or anything else you can throw. Remember, the intent is to scare and not to injure.
- Spray with a hose, if available, or a squirt gun filled with water and vinegar.
- Shake or throw a "coyote shaker"- a soda can filled with pennies or pebbles and sealed with duct tape.

The effects of hazing may not last unless all food attractants are permanently removed. This information should be shared with neighbors since hazing is most effective when the entire neighborhood is working together.

Hazing should never be attempted if the coyote is accompanied by pups or appears sick or injured. If it is the latter, please call the Borough Police Department at 412/963-7220 or the Pennsylvania Game Commission at 814/432-3187.

Small pets and children should never be left unattended. Problems are most likely to occur when the pet is out of the owner's control. It can be helpful to carry a noisemaker, squirt gun, or pepper spray. If a coyote approaches, pick up the pet or child, then start hazing. If the coyote does not leave, back away slowly while continuing to haze and go indoors if possible. Any aggressive behavior should be reported to the police department. If bites or other injuries are sustained, medical attention should be sought, and a report made. (Coyotesmart.org, 2014)





Wildlife Calls

Residents who find themselves with a snake, deer, raccoon, or other wildlife on their property and unsure what to do with it, are asked to call the Fox Chapel Police Department at 412/963-7220 or the Pennsylvania Game Commission at 814/432-3187. The Police Department will respond to all animal calls and refer residents to the animal control company that they use, as well as other options that may be available to the resident.



Yard Maintenance and Safety

The Borough would like to remind residents of yard maintenance requirements. Please note that grass cannot exceed six (6) inches in height. Hedges and brush located in the road right-of-way along any side of the property must be trimmed back six (6) feet to allow for proper sight distance and pedestrian safety. The Borough encourages residents not to plant shrubs or trees in the road right-of-way because of public safety concerns. (The Borough does not maintain trees or shrubs located in the right-of-way regardless)

because of public safety concerns. (The Borough does not maintain trees or shrubs located in the right-of-way, regardless of who originally planted them.) The Borough does trim along the guide rails and removes tree branches that block traffic signs. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Tree Removal Process

While planning property improvement projects, please be aware that the removal of any live tree, 6-inches or greater in diameter, as measured 4- ½ feet off of the ground, needs to be approved by the Tree Committee. The Tree Committee has the authority to approve the removal of up to ten trees by issuing a tree removal permit. More than ten trees require the approval of the Environmental Advisory Council. A statement from a certified arborist may be required to attest to tree disease. Fox Chapel Borough encourages the replacement of each tree that is removed with a native hardwood tree.


To apply for a Tree Removal Permit, please go to the Forms/Applications area on the Citizen Action Center on the Borough's webpage, www.fox-chapel.pa.us. Under the Environmental Advisory Council, there is a link to the Tree Removal Permit Portal. Once the permit has been submitted, a member of the Tree Committee will come to your property to assess the tree(s) that are listed on the request form. They will then determine if the trees are permitted to be removed, and an email will be sent to the resident and contractor, as long as email addresses are provided on the form.

The trees must be marked with a ribbon and numbered. If the trees are not marked or identified, the request will be denied. Permits expire one year from the date of approval.

The American Sycamore, native to Western Pennsylvania and abundant in Fox Chapel, was chosen for its tenacity, longevity, and tolerance of wet conditions. Floodplain trees like the Sycamore have proven useful in the rehabilitation of damp, boggy sites like the one being re-established. The young trees will be protected with guard tubes for the next few years. Once mature, we will not only receive the benefits of restoring the forest ecosystem but, the Sycamore's massive domed shaped canopy and striking white bark will be a stunning welcome into the community for years to come.
